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ELECTION OF WARDENS

The Council of Wardens has called for a meeting of Parishioners in the Church following 10 am Mass, Sunday, January 11, 2026, to elect one (1) warden for the statutory 3-year term of 2026-2029.

What is a Warden?

The role of the Council of Wardens is defined by the Civil Code of Quebec.

According to the Code, the Wardens are the administrators of the finances,
material goods and property intended for the religious benefit of Parishioners.

A Warden is elected by the Parishioners at a meeting called for that purpose and should live within the geographical boundaries of the Parish (Senneville, Ste.-Anne-de-Bellevue and Baie d'Urfé). The lengths of terms for the open positions are shown above. Wardens may be elected to serve a second term.

Some of the <u>attributes</u> required of a Warden are: a sense of the Mission of Christ, some administrative skills, and practical common sense.

To be considered a candidate for election, you must be nominated by two Parishioners at the meeting called for that purpose.

If you are interested in becoming a Warden, please indicate your interest to Father Stephen, Wally Rowcliffe, or one of the Wardens. Their names and phone numbers are shown on the Bulletin.

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JUBILLEE YEAR OF HOPE - 2025

The Nicene Creed Explained - Part 24

Every week, together as pilgrims of hope, we explore parts of the Nicene Creed.

We continue our reflections on the statement:

I look forward to the life of the world to come

In our previous article, we commented on the dogma of the *Particular Judgement*. In this article, we will reflect on one of the outcomes of the Particular Judgement – *Heaven*.

"Those who die in God's grace and friendship and are perfectly purified [enter Heaven immediately and] live for ever with Christ" (CCC 1023).

"Heaven is the ultimate end and fulfillment of the deepest human longings, the state of supreme, definitive happiness" (CCC 1024). As St. Augustine said in his *Confessions*: "You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you". Our life on earth is transient, we are but tourists here for only a short time, "but our citizenship is in heaven" (Philippians 3:20).

When the form of this world has passed away, those who have welcomed God into their lives and have sincerely opened themselves to his love, at least at the moment of death, will enjoy that fullness of communion with God which is the goal of human life (John Paul II, *General Audience of 21 July, 1999, 1*).

"This perfect life with the Most Holy Trinity — this communion of life and love with the Trinity, with the Virgin Mary, the angels and all the blessed — is called 'heaven'" (CCC 1024).

"To live in heaven is to be with Christ" (CCC 1025). This is our innermost desire, as we pray in Psalm 42:

As a deer longs for flowing streams, so my soul longs for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God. When shall I come and behold the face of God? (Psalm 42:1-2)

In Heaven, "we shall see [God] as he is" (I John 3:2). Saint Paul tells us that the vivid heavenly encounter with God after death will stand in contrast to the pale knowledge of God experienced on Earth: "For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face" (1 Corinthians 13:12).

These souls [in Heaven]... see the divine essence with an intuitive vision and even face to face, without the mediation of any creature... rather the divine essence immediately manifests itself to them, plainly, clearly and openly, and in this vision they enjoy the divine essence (Benedict XII, Benedictus Deus).

With our limited vocabulary and finite intellect, it is not possible to accurately describe or imagine what Heaven is like. Every analogy or depiction will fall short of the reality that awaits us if we die in a state of grace.

This mystery of blessed communion with God and all who are in Christ is beyond all understanding and description. Scripture speaks of it in images: life, light, peace, wedding feast, wine of the kingdom, the Father's house, the heavenly Jerusalem, paradise (CCC 1027).

These images are only meant to give us a sense of the immense beauty, grandeur, peace, love, joy and communion that Heaven encompasses. As Saint Paul tells us, "no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the heart of man conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him" (1 Corinthians 2:9). On this side of eternity, we cannot fully comprehend what eternal life in Heaven will be like.

We know that the "heaven" or "happiness" in which we will find ourselves is neither an abstraction nor a physical place in the clouds, but a living, personal relationship with the Holy Trinity. It is our meeting with the Father which takes place in the risen Christ through the communion of the Holy Spirit (John Paul II, General Audience of 21 July, 1999, 4).

We hold fast to Jesus' comforting words that he prepares a place for us in his Father's house:

In my Father's house are many rooms; if it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And when I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also. (John 14:2-3)

"God put us in the world to know, to love, and to serve him, and so to come to paradise" (CCC 1721). May we live our lives in a manner worthy to merit eternal life in Heaven, as Jesus promises us: "Be faithful unto death, and I will give you the crown of life" (Revelation 2:10).

There we shall rest and see, we shall see and love, we shall love and praise. Behold what will be at the end without end. For what other end do we have, if not to reach the kingdom which has no end? (CCC 1720, quoting Saint Augustine)

In our next article, we will reflect on the purification of souls in *Purgatory*.

ON THE LITURGICAL CALENDAR

The feast days of the Church are not just the commemoration of historical events; they also look to the present and the future, and give us an insight into our own relationship with God.

In December, the Church call us to focus on the Immaculate Conception

- Dec. 7 **Saint Ambrose of Milan**, Bishop of Milan, Honey-tongued <u>Doctor</u> of the Church bestowed because of his speaking and preaching ability, Father of the church, one of the four original Doctors of the Latin
- Dec. 8 **IMMACULATE CONCEPTION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY**, the solemn dogma that Mary, "full of grace" through God, was redeemed from the moment of her conception, Principal Patron of the Ecclesiastical province of Montréal (Joliette, Saint-Jean–Longueuil, St-Jérôme, Valleyfield)
- Dec. 9 **Saint Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin**, Aztek farmer chosen to receive the apparition of Mary at Tepeyac, Mexico, where Our Lady asked him to tell his Bishop that she desired a shrine to be built on the spot to manifest her love for all mankind. She left a marvelous portrait of herself on his mantle as a sign
- Dec. 10 **Our Lady of Loreto**, the Shrine of the Holy House at Loreto, the house in which Mary was born, and where the Annunciation occurred, and to an ancient statue of Our Lady which is found there. Patron aviation, builders, construction
- Dec. 10 **Saint Melchiades**, Martyr, Pope in the last period of the Christian persecution so the title of martyr is applied to him in a wider sense.
- Dec. 11 **Saint Damasus I**, Pope, commissioned the Latin Vulgate translation of the Bible, devoted to finding the tombs of martyrs which had been both blocked up and hidden during previous persecutions, vigorous defender of the orthodoxy
- Dec. 12 Canadian Day of Prayer in Solidarity with Indigenous Peoples We are invited to stand in solidarity with all Indigenous peoples of Canada by uniting our prayers with theirs.
- Dec. 12 **Our Lady of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Americas**, appeared to Juan Diego, imprinting her image on his tilma, which led to the conversion of millions of people over a 9-year period! The miraculous image is kept in the shrine built in her honor, the Basilica of Santa Maria di Guadalupe, Mexico City.
- Dec. 13 **Sainte Lucy**, Martyr, made a vow of virginity and distributed her wealth to the poor, her name appears in the second list in the Canon; Patron against hemorrhages, eye disease & problems, salesmen, throat infections; writers.
