JUBILLEE YEAR OF HOPE - 2025

We continue to examine the Papal Bull "Spes Non Confundit"

"Hope does not disappoint because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit" -Romans 5:5

A Papal (or Pontifical) "Bull of Indiction" is an official document, usually written in Latin, published by the Pope to proclaim a Jubilee Year. The Papal Bull for this Jubilee Year of Hope, translated into English, can be found here:

Each week, we have selected a few sentences from each paragraph in the Bull as inspirational reflections to help us live this Jubilee Year of Hope.

Some excerpts from Paragraph 25:

- "May we who have taken refuge in him be strongly encouraged to seize the hope set before us. We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters the inner shrine behind the curtain, where Jesus, a forerunner on our behalf, has entered" (Hebrews 6:18-20).
- The image of the anchor is eloquent; it helps us to recognize the stability and security that is ours amid the troubled waters of this life, provided we entrust ourselves to the Lord Jesus.
- May the witness of believers be for our world a leaven of authentic hope...
- •Through our witness, may hope spread to all those who anxiously seek it. May the way we live our lives say to them in so many words: "Hope in the Lord! Hold firm, take heart and hope in the Lord!" (Psalm 27:14).

The Nicene Creed Explained – Part 19

Every week, together as pilgrims of hope, we explore parts of the Nicene Creed.

We continue our reflections on the fourth section of the Nicene Creed. Following the four marks of the Church, discussed in our previous articles, the next statement in the Nicene Creed is *I profess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins*

Baptism, one of the seven Sacraments of the Church, is the first Sacrament all Christians receive. Through Baptism, we are cleansed of original sin, the Holy Spirit comes to dwell in us, and we become adopted sons and daughters of God.

Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit (*vitae spiritualis ianua*) and the door which gives access to the other sacraments. Through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons of God; we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church and made sharers in her mission (CCC 1213).

Our Lord tied the forgiveness of sins to faith and Baptism: "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation. He who believes and is baptized will be saved." Baptism is the first and chief sacrament of forgiveness of sins because it unites us with Christ, who died for our sins and rose for our justification, so that we too might walk in newness of life (CCC 977).

One Baptism

Before Jesus ascended into Heaven, he commissioned his Apostles to make disciples through Baptism in the name of the Holy Trinity (which is still used in the Rite of Baptism today):

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:19-20).

Thus, Jesus spoke of only one Baptism, echoed in the subsequent words of Saint Paul to the Ephesians:

There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, who is above all and through all and in all (Ephesians 4:4-6).

"Baptism seals the Christian with the indelible spiritual mark (*character*) of his belonging to Christ.... Given once for all, Baptism cannot be repeated" (CCC 1272).

Indelible means "permanent", "cannot be erased". The permanent character imprinted on our souls through Baptism implies that this Sacrament is received only once and cannot be repeated. The word *character* comes from the Greek *kharaktēr*, which refers to a seal, tooled stamp or engraved mark.

This permanent mark of belonging to Christ through Baptism should bring us joy and hope in that, no matter how grave our sins are, we still belong to Christ: we are "incorporated into Christ.... No sin can erase this mark, even if sin prevents Baptism from bearing the fruits of salvation" (CCC 1272).

Forgiveness of sins

"By Baptism *all sins* are forgiven, original sin and all personal sins, as well as all punishment for sin" (CCC 1263). However, because we are human and have a fallen nature, "certain temporal consequences of sin remain in the baptized, such as suffering, illness, death... as well as an inclination to sin that Tradition calls *concupiscence*" (CCC 1264).

If the Church has the power to forgive sins, then Baptism cannot be her only means of using the keys of the Kingdom of heaven received from Jesus Christ. The Church must be able to forgive all penitents their offenses, even if they should sin until the last moment of their lives (CCC 979).

When Jesus appeared to the Apostles after his resurrection, he gave them his own divine power to forgive sins by breathing on them and saying, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained" (John 20:p22-23). Through the Sacrament of Holy Orders, all priests receive this same power to forgive sins in the person of Christ (*in persona Christi*) when they hear confessions.

"It is through the sacrament of Penance [also called Reconciliation or Confession] that the baptized can be reconciled with God and with the Church" (CCC 980), and so be restored to the baptismal state of grace. Confession is thus not an optional ritual but a continuation of the call to conversion and holiness begun at our Baptism.

"This sacrament of Penance is necessary for salvation for those who have fallen after Baptism, just as Baptism is necessary for salvation for those who have not yet been reborn" (CCC 980, quoting Saint Gregory of Nazianzus).

As we continue our daily struggle to lead holy lives, we must not despair when we fall into sin but instead approach the Sacrament of Confession with true contrition and repentance.

There is no offense, however serious, that the Church cannot forgive. There is no one, however wicked and guilty, who may not confidently hope for forgiveness, provided his repentance is honest. Christ who died for all men desires that in his Church the gates of forgiveness should always be open to anyone who turns away from sin (CCC 982).

Were there no forgiveness of sins in the Church, there would be no hope of life to come or eternal liberation. Let us thank God who has given his Church such a gift.

ON THE LITURGICAL CALENDAR

The feast days of the Church are not just the commemoration of historical events; they also look to the present and the future, and give us an insight into our own relationship with God.

This month, the Church calls us to focus on the Holy Rosary. October is also Missionary Month and Clergy Appreciation Month.

- Oct. 27 Day of Prayer for Peace (Quebec)
- Oct. 27 St Frumentius of Ethiopia, (aka: Amharic Abba Salama), Bishop, apostle to Ethiopia, converted many, including the princes, establishing a firm foothold in Ethiopia for the faith, Patron of Abyssinia, Ethiopia
- Oct. 28 St Simon the Zealot (Nathanael the Cananean) & St Jude Thaddeus, Apostles, martyrs
- St Simon the Zealot (Nathanael the Cananean) apostle, called the Cananean or Zealot because of his zeal for the Jewish law although he was not from Cana, nor a member of the Zealot party, convert
- St Judas Thaddeus apostle, son of Cleophas, who died a martyr, and Mary who stood at the foot of the Cross and who annointed Christ's body after death, brother of Saint James the Lesser, wrote the canonical Epistle named for him, preached in Syria, Mesopotamia, and Persia with Saint Simon, healer and exorcist, Patron of lost or impossible causes
- Oct. 30 Nov. 10 Royal Canadian Legion's Poppy Campaign. Donation info can be found online at https://www.legion.ca/remembrance/the-poppy.
- Oct. 31 St Quentin, convert, missionary to Gaul, his preaching and example won many converts, Martyr in the Maximian persecution, tomb known as a site for miracles, relics later re-discovered by St Eligius
- Oct. 31 St Wolfgang, the Great Almoner, Benedictine, teacher; monk, prior, Bishop, evangelized the Magyars in modern Hungary, missionary to Pannonia, reformed clerical discipline and spirituality in his diocese, noted for his preaching, his teaching abilities, his charity and his care for lay people in his diocese, tutor to the future emperor Saint Henry II.
- Oct. 31 Bl. Father Michael J. McGivney, founded the Knights of Columbus
