ELECTION OF WARDENS

The Council of Wardens has called for a meeting of Parishioners in the Church Sunday, January 11, 2026, following 10 am Mass, to elect one (1) warden for the statutory 3-year term of 2026-2029.



What is a Warden?

The role of the Council of Wardens is defined by the Civil Code of Quebec. According to the Code, the Wardens are the administrators of the finances, material goods and property intended for the religious benefit of Parishioners.

A Warden is elected by the Parishioners at a meeting called for that purpose and must live within the geographical boundaries of the Parish (Senneville, Ste.-Anne-de-Bellevue and Baie d'Urfé). The lengths of terms for the open positions are shown above. Wardens may be elected to serve a second term.

Some of the attributes required of a Warden are: a sense of the Mission of Christ, some administrative skills, and practical common sense.

To be considered a candidate for election, you must be nominated by two Parishioners at the meeting called for that purpose.

If you are interested in becoming a Warden, please indicate your interest to Father Stephen, Wally Rowcliffe, or one of the Wardens. Their names and phone numbers are shown on the Bulletin.

The Nicene Creed Explained – Part 25

Every week, together as pilgrims of hope, we explore parts of the Nicene Creed.

We continue our reflections on the statement:

I look forward to the life of the world to come

As we noted in Part 23, there are only two outcomes from the *Particular Judgement*: eternity in either *Heaven* or *Hell*. In our previous article, we reflected on what Heaven is. In this article, we will reflect on *Purgatory*, a temporary state for souls *en route* to Heaven.

All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. (CCC 1030)

"The Church gives the name *Purgatory* to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned" (CCC 1031). The word *Purgatory* comes from the Latin verb *purgare*, which means "to cleanse", "to purify", or "to purge".

Souls who are imperfectly purified are those who die with venial sins and/or still have temporal punishments due from sins, venial and mortal, which have been forgiven through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Every sin, even venial, entails an unhealthy attachment to creatures, which must be purified either here on earth, or after death in the state called Purgatory. This purification frees one from what is called the "temporal punishment" of sin (CCC 1472).

This temporal punishment of sin "must not be conceived as a kind of vengeance inflicted by God... but as following from the very nature of sin" (CCC 1472), which is "an offense against God, a rupture of communion with him" (CCC 1440).

The process of purification in Purgatory prepares a soul for the holiness required to enter Heaven since "nothing unclean will enter it" (Revelation 21:27). "Every trace of attachment to evil must be eliminated, every imperfection of the soul corrected. Purification must be complete" (J. P. II, *General Audience of 4 August, 1999, 5*).

Entering Heaven immediately after the Particular Judgement is reserved for "those who die in God's grace and friendship and are perfectly purified" (CCC 1023). Purgatory is thus an expression of God's mercy: any soul not perfectly purified at the moment of death does not suffer eternal separation from God in Hell but is instead brought to a state where it can be cleansed of all attachment to sin before entering Heaven. "Purgatory shows God's great mercy and washes away the defects of those who long to become one with him." (Saint Josemaria Escriva, *Furrow*, 889)

Souls in Purgatory do not stay there forever nor do they go to Hell. They are assured of eternal salvation, as Pope Benedict XVI writes in *Spe Salvi*:

The way we live our lives is not immaterial, but our defilement does not stain us for ever if we have at least continued to reach out towards Christ, towards truth and towards love (*Spe Salvi*, 47).

Purgatory is *not* a place of second chances, where you can alter your final destination from the Particular Judgement. There are no second chances after death. Rather, Purgatory is a temporary, transitional state for those destined for Heaven but in need of purification before seeing God face-to-face.

Souls in Purgatory endure suffering in their temporary separation from God and have to “pass through ‘fire’ so as to become fully open to receiving God and able to take [their] place at the table of the eternal marriage-feast” (Benedict XVI, *Spe Salvi*, 46). This metaphor of a purifying fire reminds us of how a goldsmith refines a precious metal with intense fire, to remove impurities and ensure the quality of the final product. The resulting fire-tested gold becomes pure and uncorrupted.

The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God... God tested them and found them worthy of himself; like gold in the furnace he tried them, and like a sacrificial burnt offering he accepted them (Wisdom 3:1, 5-6).

While exposure to fire is severely painful and fatal to our bodies on Earth, the fire of God’s love is not only transformative but literally life-giving to our spiritual existence. Pope Benedict XVI writes in *Spe Salvi*:

The fire which both burns and saves is Christ himself, the Judge and Saviour... Before his gaze all falsehood melts away. This encounter with him, as it burns us, transforms and frees us, allowing us to become truly ourselves.... Yet in the pain of this encounter, when the impurity and sickness of our lives become evident to us, there lies salvation. His gaze, the touch of his heart heals us through an undeniably painful transformation “as through fire”. But it is a blessed pain, in which the holy power of his love sears through us like a flame, enabling us to become totally ourselves and thus totally of God (*Spe Salvi*, 47).

Only God knows how long one’s experience of Purgatory will be, for a soul to be perfectly purified to behold God in Heaven.

It is clear that we cannot calculate the “duration” of this transforming burning in terms of the chronological measurements of this world. The transforming “moment” of this encounter eludes earthly time-reckoning — it is the heart’s time, it is the time of “passage” to communion with God in the Body of Christ (*Spe Salvi*, 47).

"The life of each of God's children is joined in Christ and through Christ in a wonderful way to the life of all the other Christian brethren in the supernatural unity of the Mystical Body of Christ" (CCC 1474). This spiritual union is called the *Communion of Saints*.

“A perennial link of charity exists between the faithful who have already reached their heavenly home, [the Church Triumphant], those who are expiating their sins in purgatory, [the Church Suffering], and those who are still pilgrims on earth, [the Church Militant]. Between them there is, too, an abundant exchange of all good things. In this wonderful exchange, the holiness of one profits others. (CCC 1475)

Through the mystery of the *Communion of Saints*, souls in Purgatory pray for us on Earth even though they cannot pray for themselves. Our sacrifices and prayers, especially the Mass, offered for the souls in Purgatory, through God’s great mercy, hasten their purification and entrance into Heaven.

From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead (CCC 1032).

“Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them”
(CCC 1032, quoting Saint John Chrysostom)

In our next article, we will reflect on what *Hell* is.

The feast days of the Church are not just the commemoration of historical events; they also look to the present and the future, and give us an insight into our own relationship with God.

**In December, the Church call us to focus on the Immaculate Conception**

Dec. 13 – **Sainte Lucy**, Martyr, made a vow of virginity and distributed her wealth to the poor, her name appears in the second list in the Canon; Patron against hemorrhages, eye disease & problems, salesmen, throat infections; writers.

Dec. 14 – **Saint John of the Cross**, Discalced Carmelite Priest, Doctor of the Church of Mystical Theology, his reforms revitalized the Order, great contemplative and spiritual writer

December 17 Christmas is only an octave away.

We begin the 'O' Antiphons, short texts chanted during the liturgies prayed until Christmas Eve; they begin with the invocation "O" and call to mind the ancient longing and pleading of the people of the Old Testament for a Savior to come, invoking different Christological titles, which once completed, the backwards acrostic of the Latin initials of the Christological titles spell *ERO CRAS*, "Tomorrow I will come"

Ember days at the start of a new season are ordered as days of fast and abstinence, prayer and penance. We thank God for the gifts of nature and are reminded to make use of these in moderation, and to assist the needy. We offer prayers for the needs of all people, for the productivity of the earth, for human labour and for good priests. The Advent Ember Days are offered in particular thanksgiving for the olive harvest, which gives us holy oils

Dec. 17 – **Venerable Pierre Toussaint**, freed slave, successful hairdresser, put his wealth to use for the good of others, in service to the poor and needy, turning the family home into a shelter for orphans, a credit bureau, an employment agency, a hostel for priests and other poor travellers.
